PLANNING APPROVED

Amended plans for the development of 24 council bungalows, along with 3 on the other side of Portland Road, were approved at Bolsover District Council last month. Work on the development is anticipated to begin in the summer of this year.

The site was initially destined for commercial development, but with no serious interest over the years, and with a need for better council owned properties more suitable for our longer living population, the residential development was pursued.

POLITICAL COMMENT

This Government is in a 'right state' and so is the country, but you don't need me to tell you that !!

We do however need to cut through the excessive media coverage to get the message



across to a jaded public that's becoming bored with the whole political scene.

2019 onwards has disguised the real incompetence of the Government and to some degree thwarted the ability of the Labour front bench to attack without incurring the wrath of the people through being pilloried in the press.

The problem is that everyone knew then and knows now that they (the government) were borrowing cash and also printing money and, of course, that it had to be paid back, but coping with the pandemic pushed it to the back of people's minds. Our problems, however, started way before that.

Labour's prevarication on the referendum results regarding Europe upset the traditional Labour voters in the shires and also the traditional labour voters in the cosmopolitan cities, and the price paid locally was the loss of the County Council in May 2017 with further losses in May 2021.

Many Districts shared the same fate in 2019 and there has been further losses since; the most recent being High Peak which has gone into no overall control. In Derbyshire this leaves just Bolsover and Chesterfield under Labour control.

All this was compounded by a change of Labour leadership and the normal internecine warfare played out in front of an eager press and a demoralised public.

The Labour Party will develop and publish good solid policies that members and the public can recognise and support. We need to avoid petty squabbles and unguarded statements that the Tory press are eager to exploit.

Many Shire County Leaders have been clamour-

ing for devolution, thinking they will get a bigger slice of the cake – probably at the expense of the districts; and with the growing number of councilors sitting on both district and county councils (commonly referred to as two-hatters), - 'I'm alright Jack' springs to mind!

Is it really devolution or is it decentralisation? Is it just a great opportunity for the government to divide and conquer and also stop the demand by local authorities for more resources? *I think so*!!

The Government's view of devolution could be seen as a way of getting rid of responsibilities and having someone else to blame when it goes wrong.

The Shire County view may be convenient as a means of covering up the terrible state of service delivery and if they believe that becoming a Mayoral Combined Authority with more power and an extra few quid will solve all their problems they are living in 'cloud cuckoo land'. Most Counties are finding it tough and it will get worse if the same policies continue.

Like most Tory Governments they want to duck their responsibilities under the guise of laissez faire by passing it on to Counties or anyone else for that matter.

The Counties want to pass it on to the Mayoral Combined Authorities with the remaining District 'machinery' picking up the tab and providing the services. The effectiveness of District Councils has been well established over the years especially the last three.

The government knows this but is in a political quandary; as I've said, their political power lies with shire counties but they cannot deliver, except through the district machine.

The political control of the districts is more difficult to manage even of the same persuasion so they would have to go and the best way is to let them all squabble for the extra few guid

Let's not let the Tories set the pace and the agenda. They have that many problems and distractions that we need to concentrate on the key issues.



Frequently asked questions / rumour mill With more developments and changes occurring the more questions and speculation takes place.

This is only natural and normal; I do it regularly with government statements and I have to read, listen and watch before I make up my mind and even then I always look between the lines, especially with bureaucratic legalese.

So I'm never surprised when I'm asked to explain some things that have not been previously explained or poorly reported. So what are the latest.

Is the £150 gift from the gov't coming off the council tax?

No. the gov't is using the council tax banding and collection mechanism to distribute it. Bolsover are paying those with direct debit accounts first irrespective of benefit or discount status. Others will take longer in order to prevent fraud.

Why are there no elections around here?

The local elections being referred to in the media are those authorities that retire in thirds. Councillors still sit for four years but election times are staggered, some cities and districts adopt this method; Derby City being one such example. Bolsover District Councillors retire enbloc in an election year. With the next election being in 2023

What is the council doing about high street shops?

The council can only encourage shopping locally with 'shop local' campaigns, free parking and little or no charge for business rates. Residential developments around high streets and shopping centres will encourage increased footfall and more retail activity.

Locally there is plenty of development activity and that provokes comment, discussion and proposed alternatives.

We've often said there needs to be a link between Brook Park (the old pit site) and Shirebrook town centre. So Bolsover District Council bought the land on Portland Drive, opposite Lyndon Transport, with a view to develop a commercial/technical centre, readers will notice that its recently been cleared.

Like many politicians, besides the many e-mails and telephone calls each day from the press and public, I also get asked to visit community groups primarily to address local issues.

One such meeting was with the residents of Briar Close, who wanted some explanation and clarification as to what was going off in their area.

Briar Close is an area requiring renewal. The 50 plus bungalows have come to the end of their useful life having been built at a time when standards weren't as high as today's.

The Council is in the process of relocating the remaining tenants, if possible in their area of choice.

Talking about the elderly and housing the County Council is expected to close at least half a dozen care homes, two of which are in the Bolsover District. At a time of hardship for our elderly and infirm the Conservative County Council are creating more pain and suffering. Cllr Christine Dale has tried to stop the closure and even suggested ways to renovate buildings.

The knock on effect of closure is that many hospital patients have to remain in hospital because they have nowhere suitable to care for them. Compare that to BDC's investment in its own sheltered accommodation like Ashbourne Court.

On top of that DCC is set to close the day centres for the disabled. Cllr Sandra Peake is appalled by this attack on the sick and disabled and is championing a campaign and running a petition both online and physically. She is being ably supported by Cllr Liz Smyth, Christine and the Trade Unions.

SHIREBROOK CREMATORIUM

The proposed crematorium planned for Shirebrook took another step closer last month

when specialist crematorium designers CDS presented their ideas to members of Bolsover District Council.

At the presentation CDS director Justin Smith, talked in depth about the facilities potential 'green credentials'. He informed members that the average crematorium, using natural gas, would produce around 150 tonnes of carbon dioxide a year, and in order to combat this figure, Mr Smith proposed the use of electricity instead.

As previously reported the Proposals would see a 21st century complex that would be sympathetic to the environment and would be a facility that would incorporate: a tranquillity garden, service hall, lobby of light, crematory hall, administration block, garden of remembrance, on site wake facilities, as well as car parking and landscaping.

The proposals for Bolsover District Council to build a £9million complex on Shirebrook Town Council's land, adjacent to the cemetery, isn't a new idea.

In fact Shirebrook Town Council first talked about the feasibility of building a crematorium in Shirebrook more than fifteen years ago.

Over recent months Bolsover District have consulted with local funeral directors who have given them their support for a more local crematorium rather than people having to travel outside the District. There's still a long way to go, and if everything goes smoothly, it is hoped that a planning application could be submitted sometime in June with a decision to be made around September of this year.

DID YOU KNOW

The first recorded official cremation in the UK was carried out on March 26th 1885

In 1920, according to the Cremation Society's figures, there were only 1,716 cremations carried out in the UK, that was only 0.3% of the 466,130 deaths recorded that year.





Move on another hundred years and the figures have drastically changed. 2020 saw 493,525 cremations equating to 80.89% of the 610.121 recorded deaths.

The current average cost of a cremation in the UK is under £4,000 compared to just over £5,000 for a burial funeral. These figures will differ depending on location, type of service, transport etc., but as the historical figures show, we as a nation have definitely moved down the cremation way!!

Add to this the current economic climate and the emergence of the 'basic cremation with no frills' service, then why can't Bolsover District have its own crematorium!!

BOLSOVER DISTRICT COUNCIL'S 'ENFORCEMENT TEAM'

Over the past six-months Bolsover District Council has changed the way it deals with enforcement action like dog fouling, litter and untidy gardens.

Gone are the days when one department was called to a problem, only for it then to be passed to another department to follow it up. Working closely with the Police and dealing with issues such as anti-social behaviour, noise issues, graffiti, dog fouling, the officers are all now part of a central team that provides a better, consistent and coordinated service.

Council Leader, Steve Fritchley said: "It never made sense to me to have those responsible for enforcement split between different departments. So I asked for a review and we now have one enforcement team who can readily share information on a range of issues and deal with any problems as soon as practicable.

"We have already seen an improvement when it comes to tackling litter and fly-tipping and we have helped the Police during recent incidents to help provide information and a reassuring presence in the community.

The team regularly patrol the District, dealing with and responding to issues of anti-social behaviour and can also help vulnerable residents with a range of safe and secure measures to help them feel safe in their own home.

Steve added: "Graffiti, litter, large groups, antisocial behaviour...these are all issues that cause huge amounts of stress and worry to neighbourhoods, so the changes we have made to the Enforcement Team will enable us to deal with and respond to them more quickly and efficiently before they get out hand."

The Enforcement Team patrol the District on a daily basis but if you need their help and assistance please call 01246 242424 or visit https://selfservice.bolsover.gov.uk/en

At the moment the Enforcement Team can issue on the spot fines for environmental issues like dog fouling and littering, but talks on in the pipeline, between BDC and the Police, to give the Enforcement Team powers in dealing with other issues.

POLICE REPORT

Your Shirebrook Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team led by Sergeant Mark Church, work alongside partnerships / agencies to both target and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, with the aim of keeping our area safe.

"For those of you who follow our Shirebrook SNT Facebook page you will have seen that the team have unfortunately had to consider it necessary to impose a couple of 'Dispersal Orders' in recent times. I thought that I would use this opportunity to explain what this is.

"A 'Dispersal Order' is a power which must be authorised by an officer of a rank at least that of Inspector. The order relates to a specified locality during a specified period of not more than 48 hours. If granted the power then allows police officers (such as one of my SNT team) to deal with people who may cause other members of the community to feel harassed, alarmed or distressed or to prevent crime and disorder.

"It's a real shame that the local team have felt a need to use these powers but unfortunately we have been made aware of incidents when things have been thrown at fire officers and also things being thrown from a bridge at cars. I'm sure that you will agree that these type of incidents are both antisocial and dangerous!!

"I get no pleasure whatsoever from seeing my team having to criminalise children but by the same token I can't allow children to throw things in such a dangerous and antisocial way. As always, it's only a small minority of children that do wrong and the vast majority of Shirebrook children are kind and good.

"I appeal to all parents and carers to make sure

that they take responsibility for their children. Make sure that you know what your children are up to, who they are with and where they are. Be interested in your children and give them guidance and rules to follow so that they do well in life and their chosen careers

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Today's platforms on social media give everyone the chance to voice their opinion, have a moan, and to criticise or to praise.

Over recent times the Town Council has been and criticism. Sometimes

the target of both praise and criticism. Sometimes opinions can be worthy of consideration, but other times they can be unfounded, outrageous and bordering on the verge of libellous.

I don't indulge on facebook etc., and I don't have the need to have 'keyboard arguments', but I am always being told what is and isn't being said.

Having said that, as the Chairman of Shirebrook Town Council and a sitting District Councillor I feel that I need to address one recent criticism. One that implies that the Labour controlled Town and District Council are responsible for the decline of our shopping centre!! What do these people want us to do!!

We all know that shopping trends have changed over recent years and a good number of shoppers now either shop out of town or on-line.

As a Town Council we are the custodians of the

market square itself but we don't own, apart from the Town Hall, any of the properties on the square.

Financially we're not in a position to assist or 'subsidise' private businesses. We're not in a position as to dictate what type of business (within reason) would like to come to our Town and we are not in a position were we can dictate business opening hours.

As a Town Council some may say that we should not charge for market days, but who would pick up the wage bills and running costs. As I have previously reported, our prices for the market are very reasonable and fees start from as little as £8 a pitch.

To help promote our shopping centre we want to make the square a more welcoming proposition to visitors old and new, but it takes time and finances. And as a Shirebrook person, I would love to see the square bustling with shoppers every day of the week!!

As regards the District Council, Bolsover, along with most authorities up and down the country, offer businesses 'Small Business Rate Relief', which means that depending on the size of the property, businesses pay very little or no business rates.

Over the years, Bolsover District Council have offered grants for improvements to business premises to help with improvements, shop frontages and security.

Councillor DALE'S DIARY



Dear Readers, Far from good news following the lifting of restrictions after the pandemic.

We face troubling times in the world at present. Russia invaded the Ukraine and sadly 10 million Ukrainian families are now displaced

from their homes living as refugees having fled their country in terror as the Russian's attack civilians and commit atrocities in their Country.

Disappointingly our Prime Minister and Chancellor of the Exchequer have been fined by the police for breaching COVID restrictions and flagrantly flouting their own laws in attending parties during lock down and the PM is now under investigation for misleading Parliament.

It is an expectation that those who make the laws should set an example and keep them.

This lack of standards by those in power has caused great distress to so many people who were unable to see their loved ones during the past two years of lockdown restrictions, and those who sadly suffered the loss of loved ones through death and were unable to be close to them at the end of their lives.

Following the horrific attack at home on Cllr Ken

Walker, Honorary Alderman and former Civic Chairman of the District Council and his wife Freda, Freda's funeral took place at Holy Trinity Church in Shirebrook on Maundy Thursday.

Ken, although frail and out of hospital, was able to attend his wife's funeral. During the very moving service members of the Cantamus Choir performed a number of songs including 'All Things Bright and Beautiful', 'Over the Rainbow' and 'Hearts of Love'. Ken and Freda's friend Cllr Brian Murray-Carr sang a Nat King Cole number called 'Smile'.

Over two hundred people attended Freda's funeral including family, friends, Civic Dignitaries from all over and Council Officers. A further short service took place at Mansfield Crematorium followed by a reception for mourners in Shirebrook Village Hall.

Spring is a time when we look forward to renewal and rebirth, and after such a long period under restrictions and the isolation people suffered putting their lives on hold, it's a joy to see new groups springing up and people meeting and socialising once again.

I received an invitation recently to a newly formed mother, baby and toddler group which started up just before Easter on Friday mornings at the 'Hole in the Wall' on Carter Lane. It was uplifting to see young children playing and exploring with their mothers. The Centre is open from 10.00am onwards. welcome. I am helping this new start up group with $\pounds500$ of funding from my community leadership allowance so they can buy the essential things they need to run the group.

The Mother and Toddler group run by Maxine and Gemma at the Hub in New Houghton on Tuesday lunchtimes is now well established and proving very popular with young mums and dads alike. They have extended the time they meet to 2.00pm in the afternoon.

I have also promised to support the Shirebrook Wednesday Self Help group for older people which meets at the Shirebrook Leisure Centre, with the sum of £500 to support start up costs now they're arranging meetings again.

Recently I was invited to the Model Village Residents Association in Shirebrook. The Committee is busy organising a party for families in the Model Village for the Queens Platinum Jubilee. I'm donating the sum of £500 towards these celebrations.

Members of the Community Hub in New Houghton are also organising a party for the villagers for the Queens Platinum Jubilee and I am also donating the sum of £500 towards this event in New Houghton.

For all keen cycling enthusiast's - I was invited to the formal opening by the Derbyshire Highways Authority at Pleasley Country Park, of the new cycle tracks at Pleasley, which now connect up with Nottinghamshire tracks giving cyclists a safer, longer and improved route to enjoy cycling.

£500 has been invested in developing the new tracks in Pleasley for cyclists, and I can strongly recommend the facilities and attractions at Pleasley Country Park for both cyclists and visitors.

Apart from the pleasant tranquil sights and sounds of nature whilst out in the Country Park, there is an excellent Mining Museum free for the public to visit, and a new café to stop off for light refreshments during the day, or one or two course main meals served at lunch times, at very reasonable prices.

I reported three loose manhole covers close together on Stinting Lane, following the resurfacing of the road, as they were keeping residents awake at night with the loud irritating noise emitted each time a vehicle drove over them. They have now been repaired. A very large and dangerous pothole at Stony Houghton located on a bend and junction, after reporting, has now been repaired thank goodness!

We have a problem on Wood Lane in Shirebrook with people constantly fly tipping rubbish which attract vermin, is unsightly and spoils our beautiful surrounding countryside.

this rubbish, it's one of the functions carried out by Bolsover District Council.

There are several ways you can report fly tipping!! You can contact your local District Councillor or phone Bolsover District Council on 01246 242424 or go to Bolsover District Council's website and report it. The District Council is very efficient at collecting the rubbish once reported!!

However thinking about it - additional collections put an extra burden, cost wise, on the Council. Even more so now petrol and diesel prices have increased and who bears the cost?

Some authorities, for example in Kent, have taken action and put secret cameras at popular fly tipping spots to catch the culprits, and once caught, the Council turns up and penalises them by impounding their vehicle and taking it away to a compound, charging a hefty penalty for its release.

It has significantly reduced domestic fly tipping in those areas, perhaps we could have some of the same in our District!!

In Adult Care the Conservative controlling group are now planning to close seven of its residential homes for the elderly, and eight Day Care Centres for those with severe learning disabilities. Shirebrook Day Centre on Carter Lane is amongst those listed for closure.

There is a workforce crisis in Adult Care as they are unable to retain care workers in residential homes and home care, because the wages are

below the living wage. The care workers who were on the frontline during the pandemic in looking after the elderly and disabled did not receive any bonus or recognition for the sterling work in protecting and caring for the vulnerable and putting their own lives at risk in the pandemic

The handyman service has been disbanded without any public consultation or even informing its users. I have elderly residents who rely on this service in Shirebrook. They are also continuing with cuts to assistive technology which helps elderly people to remain independent and live at home longer. We're in a cost of living crisis so it is unlikely they will be able to afford the technology to help them survive. I voted against a reduction in these essential services which support the vulnerable.

In property services they have recently realised £1,000,000 in sales of County buildings and a consultant has been employed to continue the work of selling off Council buildings.

There has been no reduction in Council Tax as a consequence of the money savings made by a substantial reduction in services. County imposed a further increase of 3% this year which I voted against. However they have increased recently the number of highly paid senior officer posts.

The treasury coffers are healthy but it seems they have plans in place for it to be used for other purposes. That's it till next time!!

PLANNING FINALLY APPROVED

Amended plans for the proposed development of Council bungalows on Portland Road, Shirebrook, where finally approved at Bolsover District Council last month.

The initial proposals proposed 26 properties on the site, but due to a few environmental issues, one being noise pollution, plans had to be redesigned and now the site will accommodate 24 much needed council properties.

The former recreation ground, known by many, as the 'paddler', has been underused as a recreation ground for many years, and as readers and residents alike will know, the site was earmarked for commercial development some fifteen or so years ago.

As part of Bolsover's 'Masterplan' this area (owned by Shirebrook Town Council) along with the former flats (owned by BDC) were initially going to be purchased by Tesco, but those plans, due to Tesco's restructuring, fell by the wayside.

As we know Lidl came along, invested in Shirebrook and built their store on the former flats site, but they didn't want the recreation ground. The recreation ground was offered for commercial development but alas no serious offer and no definitive interest was ever shown.

As we all know shopping trends have drastically changed over the years and continue to do so, with more and more of us 'on-line shopping' and 'out of town' shopping, and then the pandemic hit!!

As we have previously said, places like Shirebrook will find it more and more difficult to attract investment from those large retailers or even other potential retailers, there is just not enough money to go around !!

It doesn't mean that we have to roll over, we still need to invest in our Town Centre, look after our current businesses, to the best of our abilities, and perhaps hope that someone out there will want to invest in our Town.

We have the potential !! But we all have to be in the fight and the only way to promote and save our shopping centre is to shop LOCALLY and to make our Town appealing enough to continue to attract shoppers from across the District!!

Whilst shopping trends have changed, and changed considerably for places like Shirebrook, the demand for more accommodation for our more aged residents has increased.

We are all, hopefully, living longer and we need more accommodation like the proposed bungalows. Bungalows owned and managed by the local authority and not properties owned by those in the private sector. Hence, why the decision to go ahead with this development was tak-

Three similar bungalows are to be built, at the same time, on the garage site (opposite Wright's garage) just across the road, and it is anticipated that work on the development will commence in the summer.

We need these developments, we need to look after our senior residents in the twilight of their life, but we have to get the balance right. We don't want our 'shopping centre' to become a 'retirement centre'.

But I strongly believe that this development and the extension development at the near-by Ashbourne Court doesn't impinge on our retail centre.

If anything it will allow more Shirebrook residents to actually use our centre instead of having to travel from the exteriors of our Town.

This development is part of Bolsover District Council's proposals to build 400 new homes across the District over the next four years.

SHIREBROOK HERITAGE CENTRE

They are a non-profit organisation and encased charity, wholly reliant upon community support, fundraising and whatever they can create and sell themselves, to obtain funds to pay for vet and food bills. They receive no government funding!!

PATCHWORK ROW

This part of Main Street, known as Patchwork Row, was the main road though the town centre, before King Edward Street was constructed, allowing traffic to the square,

This section of Main Street became known as Patchwork Row due to the 'varied nature of the buildings and frontages in the early days of its construction'

This photo, from around 1920, reveals the lack of buildings on the left hand side of the road.

Many of our older readers, more than likely spent a lot of their youth on Patchwork Row.

Many would have had many a night at Charlie Faulkner's Elite Dance Hall (where the chemist and car park are now), and further down the road, where now stands the Salvation Army, the Central Dance Hall.

These two venues apparently, where definitely, so I'm told, the places to be in Shirebrook during the 1940's, 50's and 60's !!

Add to this the abundance of pubs and clubs in the area, two cinemas in the village and other places



to meet and socialise, I understand why some of our older residents yearn for a return of years gone by!!

Whilst talking about this area and time of Shirebrook's past, do any of you have any photos of King Edward Street before it was opened up to Portland Road?

I well remember buses turning at Ward's corner to get onto the square, but for the life of me, I can't remember or picture that area before it was opened up to Portland Road!!

DID YOU KNOW!!

The 'Langwith Maltings' railway station was opened by the Midland Railway, with bunting, flags and a ceremony, on June the 1st 1875. It initially provided a service of six trains each way, three between Mansfield and Worksop, and three between Mansfield and Sheffield Victoria.

In fact there was to be another 'station' at Langwith near the pit, a simple affair to allow miners and factory workers on and off as they came to and from work. It was called the 'paddy station'.

The colliery platform, as it was sometimes called, was first used on August the 8th 1894 and it cost £400 to build

The line was and remains a 'double track'. The station had two opposite platforms and a stone station building, very similar to those at Shirebrook West, Elmton & Creswell and Whitwell.

The last day of service at the station was on October the 10th 1964, the closure having been delayed for a week to serve the annual Nottingham Goose Fair. *The station was demolished in* 1978.

The line was reopened in 1998 as part of the present Robin Hood Line, but the station was not reopened and a new station was built, the Langwith Whaley Thorns station, less than a mile further along the line.

REMEMBERING IAN

The new year began on a very sad note with the news of the death of our good friend, Ian Hill following a long illness.

It was no surprise that his funeral, held on 23rd January was well attended with people wanting to pay their tribute to him and offer



their condolences to Kiltie, with whom he'd had a long and happy married life, his three sons; Simon, Jonathan and Adam and his grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Born on 4th October 1939 to Beatrice and Reginald Hill, Ian had been part of our church community since the day he was born – his father was churchwarden – and one of his playmates in childhood was John, son of the then vicar, Rev William Hurt, later known as the world-famous actor Sir John Hurt.

For many people, lan was Holy Trinity Church. Over the years he carried out many roles: some of these included: PCC treasurer, PCC secretary, electoral roll officer, editor of The Crusader and altar server; not to mention the years that he and kiltie organised the annual flower festivals each summer which saw people from miles around – even from overseas – visit the church to see the scores of flower arrangements and well dressings.

When the church required extensive repairs to the roof in 1998, lan was the mastermind behind the building fund, raising thousands of pounds for the necessary repairs which mean the church remains open today. He also complied a comprehensive history of the church.

He was always first to welcome people into church with a smile and a kind, reassuring word.

lan's professional life was spent in teaching. He was for many years headteacher at Green Arbour Special School in Rotherham. A talented man, one of his skills was wood carving and he was fortunate enough to be commissioned to create several pieces of public art.

Most of us will have relied on him over the years – for his kindness and wisdom. Although he hadn't

been able to attend church for some time because of the COVID-19 pandemic, his contributions to the online Bible study groups were always welcome.

He will be sincerely missed in our worshipping community!!
