POLITICAL COMMENT

It was a good result locally and nationally for the Labour Party last month.

The Labour Party won seats and control of authorities up and down the country and at the same time, the Conserva-

tive Party lost more than a 1,000 seats.

However, the Party cannot rest on its laurels, I want Labour to win and form a government based on sound policies and ambitions not because the Tory Party are imploding, so now's the time for us to show a strong and united front. Then and only then will the electorate have the confidence to vote in large numbers for us at the next General Election, and return a Labour Government !!

Just like Bolsover District Council the National Party needs to demonstrate its ability to govern and produce what people want !!

I've been proud to have led Bolsover District Council for the past four years and even more so recently when I was elected Leader for another term. Bolsover have always been a forward thinking Council and has put measures in place to maintain and build on our services, protect jobs and create security for our workforce, created an in-house building company and started a programme of building affordable homes for today's generation and for generations to come.

Flexibility and the ability to react quickly to changes in legislation and society is essential to stay ahead.

We have spent more than £10million on refurbishing our Independent Living Centres at Creswell, Clowne, Hillstown, Shirebrook and Pinxton, to ensure our elderly and vulnerable have somewhere decent to live.

We will continue with these types of investments with projects such as new roofs, soffits and facias on council properties, new kitchens, and wet rooms where appropriate, all to ensure our tenants have a good quality home to live in and we continue to be the perfect landlord.

Re-purposing land and garage sites in all areas has paid dividends and removed eyesores. Over $\pounds 2,000,000$ has been generated through the sale of surplus land over the past 4 years.

We have maintained a balanced budget for each of the last 4 years and have secured financial security for the authority for the coming term.

Over the next four years we want to continue the policies we've established over the previous four years. Projects for future include (locally):

Identifying opportunities for growth and improving connectivity across the district. Continue working to create a new road link between J.29 and Shirebrook. Delivery of 2,000 new homes and 30 hectares of employment land.

Through Dragonfly, (the Council owned Company) to build and buy properties for private sale and rent and council stock, which will generate an income, provide much needed rental accommodation for the district and fill a gap by the diminishing number of private buy-to-let landlords. To build commercial properties with the aim of providing business opportunities and generate a revenue income for the council.

Pleasely Vale - An ambitious multi-million-pound redevelopment of mill buildings and improved visitor attraction and leisure facilities.

And finally, to continue working with Parish Councils to improve or to provide facilities.

Earlier this year Bolsover Constituency Labour Party members selected their candidate, Natalie Fleet from Huthwaite for the next General Election,

I recently met up with Natalie and asked her about her views and what she would like to see in the future. She told me:

"When Labour lost in 2010, I was gutted and knew I needed to get involved. Since then I've been active at every level, knocking on doors and motivating members in my branch and constituency, getting elected to East Midlands Labour Regional Board to make members' voices heard, and creating education policy on the National Policy Forum.

"My focus has always been fighting to regain and retain power at all levels, so we can make the most difference to our communities.

"I've spoken up passionately for our party and our area in local, national and international print and broadcast media. It's not in

my nature to walk on by when I see an injustice.

"My Priorities, I have a few but the main ones are:

"Education - Bolsover's schools lost over £200 per pupil between 2015 and 2020. That's the equivalent of 60 teachers across our towns and villages.

"A third of pupils in Bolsover receive free school meals, but reversing the progress made with a Labour government, the attainment gap has been widening for these pupils under the Tories. I'll keep fighting for our schools and early years to be invested in, and for good quality, affordable and available childcare right across the constituency.

"NHS - Twelve years of Tory cuts have hit hard. Their new promise of a GP appointment in two weeks is a slap in the face to residents who used to be able to access a same-day appointment. I'll push for more investment in our local NHS. bringing down waiting times and working to reverse the stagnating life expectancy.

"I'll fight for rapid access to mental health support, making sure Labour's new national target - guaranteeing mental health support within a month for those who need - is rolled out promptly across Bolsover

"Cost of Living - Too many people tell me they will have to choose between heating and eating last winter. The Tory answer is to frack for gas under our homes, but I'll stand against this and highlight the detrimental impact this would have to our area. Instead, Labour's Great British Energy Company will establish the UK as a clean energy superpower, guaranteeing long term energy secu-



rity, bringing down energy prices for residents across our area. In the meantime, I'll fight for energy companies making huge profits to face a wind-

fall tax that subsidises bills, rather than taxpayers subsidising their profit

"Housing - Bolsover District Council have shown how Labour in power can make great things happen. The amount of social rented housing across Bolsover is higher than both the regional and national average, and private rented housing is lower.

"I'll support the powerful ambitions to keep finding innovative ways to extend the social housing offer.

"The next Labour government will set a target to ensure 70% of residents own their own homes: I'll work to make sure new developments are genuinely affordable, with the cost linked to local incomes "

LOCAL ELECTION RESULTS

Labour candidates who stood locally, both for Town/Parish wards and District wards, mirrored the success of the Labour Party nationally at last month's local elections.

Nationally, Labour saw a net gain of 537 councillors and 22 councils and became the political party with the most members elected to local government for the first time since 2002.

Therefore the political 'make-up' of Langwith Parish Council is seven (7) Labour, four (4) Independent and one (1) of 'no political party' Councillors.

POLICE REPORT

Your Shirebrook Safer Neighbourhood Policing Team led by Sergeant Mark Church, work alongside partnerships / agencies to both target and reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, with the aim of keeping our area safe.

"With the longer days and shorter nights its natural that teenagers are staying out longer, so I make a simple appeal to parents to make sure that you know that your children are safe and well. Just as importantly please set them a good example and encourage them to avoid being becoming involved in antisocial behaviour.

"For anyone who is unnecessarily having to suffer from antisocial behaviour, don't suffer in silence !! Feel free to report this matter either directly to my team or via 101 or online reporting. The council also should be considered for the reporting of antisocial behaviour.

"PCSO Evan Mason and PCSO Sam Fellows, have been doing some excellent work at Model Village Primary School.

"Evan and Sam are working in the school on a project called 'Mini-Police', but I thought that it would be better if I asked Evan to share a few words about the Mini-Police Project. Here is what Evan has to say."



"My name is PCSO Evan Mason and I, with the rest of Shirebrook SNT Police, help run and organise something we have called mini police.

"Mini police is currently being conducted at the Model Village Primary School here in Shirebrook and was in its infancy when I first joined the team in August of 2022.

"In co-operation with the students and teachers at the school, members of Shirebrook SNT deliver educational seminars around issues that we believe are facing and troubling the young children of Shirebrook. These lessons include education on road safety and speeding, fire safety and cyber-



crime as well as sessions that revolve more about the police and what we do.

"Mini Police isn't just about education and lessons delivered in a classroom, but a key fundamental part of Mini Police are the **'reward sessions'**, which, as one would expect, are the days the students most look forward to.

"The rewards session includes visits from the drone, dog and armed response units and to see first-hand and up close the vehicles and equipment used by these segments of the police as well as more active reward sessions such as solving their very own crime scene.

"Although, as mentioned, Mini Police is in its infancy stage, I have nothing but praise for the outcome of the Mini Police sessions. Not only have we at Shirebrook SNT noticed the children now engaging with us more outside of school hours, but we have also found that the students and the families will often approach us and know us by name, which makes community engagement more rewarding. I look forward to seeing the Mini Police flourish in years to come as more schools will be delivering these sessions."

"Early intervention is essential in deterring crime and starting with students who are going from year 6 to year 7, I believe, is one of the most impressionable years for children, what with the threat of peer pressure and the fears of going into secondary school.

"Mini Police allows us at Shirebrook SNT to offer that supporting shoulder for the students and helps us to deliver what we hold dear to all our hearts – Shaping the future, doing the right thing and making a difference."

DID YOU KNOW ?

Charles acceded to the British throne on his mother's death on 8th September 2022. He was the longest-serving British heir apparent, having surpassed Edward VII's record of 59 years on 20th April 2011.

When he became monarch at the age of 73, Charles was the oldest person to do so, the previous record holder being William IV, who was 64 when he became king in 1830.

Arguments are made for a few different kings, thought to have controlled enough Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, to be deemed the true first king of England, but for many, Alfred the Great, who initially ruled Wessex, one of the seven Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, is listed as the first.

Charles's mother, Elizabeth II, is our longest reigning monarch, having been on the throne for seventy years. Lady Jane Grey is remembered in British history as the monarch with the shortest reign, just nine days in July of 1553.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT



Firstly, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone that turned out and voted at last month's local elections, and especially to those of you who voted for your local Labour candidates.

Of the fourteen Labour candidates that stood for the Town Council, and the

six who stood for our three district council seats, the results couldn't have been any better, with all Labour candidates being returned to serve on the relevant authorities. *We must be doing something right !!*

We had our first meeting, since the May elections, recently and it was good to see the new faces as well as those who have served Shirebrook for a number of years.

It's a difficult task sometimes, being a local councillor. We all like to have a moan and a groan, we all have our own opinions, and sometimes we have to accept criticism, but I'd just like to, following continued misinformation on social media sites, put the record straight !!

Shirebrook Town Council is NOT run as a 'secret society' with 'deals done under the table', and anyone is welcome to attend council meetings !!

As well as 'Full Council' meetings, which take place every two months, we have 'Leisure Committee', which looks after our leisure and events programmes, meetings, and 'Operation Committee', which looks after our estates and operational programmes, meetings, which are normally held alternately between the Full Council meetings.

Meetings are advertised on the Council's website, which is **www.shirebrooktowncouncil.gov.uk**, along with agendas and previous meetings minutes, but like most things in life, dates and times may have to be changed or meetings may have to be cancelled.

At the Council meeting we allocate a ten minute slot where members of the public can ask questions relating to Town Council issues. Residents can also submit more in-depth questions, prior to a meeting, which then can be put on the agenda for further discussion.

Unfortunately, the law states that members of the public have to leave the meeting if there are items that we called '**exempt'** items. These are more than likely contractual issues or personnel issues. These items are identified as such on the agenda.

Members of the public are also entitled to book an appointment at the office if they would like to discuss the Council's practices, why a decision was made or our plans for the future etc.

So you can see, we are definitely NOT a closed and secret organisation !!

STILL HIGH ON THE AGENDA !! The newly elected District Council still have building new and affordable council properties, across the District, high on its agenda !!

Bolsover's 'Bolsover Homes' project will hopefully see upwards of 400 new properties over a four year period, built across the District with Shirebrook and Langwith benefiting from around fifty odd, already built or in the process of being built, new properties.

Sites are continued to be identified across the District, that may be suitable for housing, and the Council will continue to build in-house to make the target of 400 achievable.

As readers may know the Council's previous developer, Woodheads, ceased trading last year,

and Bolsover created its own development company, '**Dragonfly Development**' to pick up where Woodheads had stopped, securing work already undertaken, jobs and further developments already in the pipeline.

The homes being built will be efficient and affordable and have been described as **'some of**





the best council houses there's ever been'.

The development of twenty odd bungalows off Portland Road is well underway, with properties at various stages of build across the site.

> The first development on the Woodlands, 'Willow Close' (opposite East View) is virtually complete and tenants have moved in.

Progress is now being seen on a smaller site at the end of West Street, and the site on Moorfield Lane is being prepared for building work.

The demand for housing is as high as ever. In Bolsover District alone 2,000 are on the waiting list, and 90 to 100 are bidding for each property as it comes available.

It was reported back in 2021, by the Department for Levelling Up - Housing and Communities, that there where 20,874 households waiting for a council house in Derbyshire alone, and in April of this year it was reported that over 1.2million households are on the waiting list for social homes in England.

Last year, 29,000 social homes were sold or demolished and less than 7,000 were built. The gap will continue to grow and the problem will continue to get worse if things carry on as they are !!

Private Landlords up and down the country are selling up, mainly due to rising interest rates and legislative and regulatory changes, which are placing extra and significant burdens on them.

Reduced rentable housing stock and the booming demand are creating higher rents and driving many renters out of the market, so who is to pick-up the shortfall !!

During the height of '**council building**' back in the 1950's, councils built on average around 147,000 homes every year, but in the past ten year councils have only averaged building around 1,400 homes a year.

Council housing's main priority is and has always been to be more affordable than the private renting market, and usually provides a more secure and long-term tenancy.

It offers stability and greater protection, and tenants can normally live in the property for the rest of their lives, as long as they don't break the conditions of the tenancy.

Bolsover District Council are '**bucking the trend**', they have identified the shortfalls in the market and they are doing something about it. More council properties, for tenants of all ages and abilities, need to be built.

Its's more difficult for people to get on the property ladder, as a population we are living longer, so, more council properties please !!

Councillor DALE'S DIARY



What a thrill it was to attend the opening ceremony of the new memorial statue.

The event followed an intensive three years of active fundraising by the Miners Welfare Colliery Memorial Committee.

We mustn't forget Shirebrook's past as a mining town and the important role it played in the economy. Mining areas were a pivotal part in fuelling Britain's manufacturing industry and growing our economy as well as keeping the nation warm.

The splendid memorial in the Market Square is a reminder to future generations of Shirebrook's industrial heritage.

The Market Square was full to bursting with people at the unveiling of the Memorial on Sunday 30th April. Most of those present had close family ties with the 74 men who had lost their lives and whose names are etched on the memorial.

The Miners Welfare Band together with welfare members, carrying the repaired Shirebrook Colliery Banner, proudly paraded through Shirebrook down to the Market Square, where the band performed at the opening ceremony.

On the day, we heard some excellent opening speeches from Alan Gascoyne and Bruce Towers, members of the Colliery Memorial Committee, and the Sculptor Peter Walker. Sadly 'Baz' Henderson one of the original prime movers for the memorial and a committee member couldn't be with us as he passed away during the lock down. *His wife Bev Henderson was given the honour of unveiling the memorial.*

It was great a experience to see the former mining community of Shirebrook and surrounding villages coming together to raise an unbelievable two hundred thousand pounds for a significant memorial in recognition of the men worked at Shirebrook Colliery and to those who had lost their lives down Shirebrook pit.

I had the privilege of donating £2,000 of my leadership allowance towards the memorial at the beginning of the fundraising venture, and it was wonderful on the day to see the memorial standing magnificently at the centre of the Market Square.

Funding from my leadership allowance has recently been donated to the following community groups.

£500 to the **Freedom Project** based in the Methodist Church in Shirebrook. They run a weekly session on Tuesday mornings between 10.00am *continued on page 18*

OLD SHIREBROOK !!

As we all know, residents old and new, Shirebrook has changed dramatically over its relatively short history, and it continues to change, seemingly day-by-day.

Housing has played a major part in its development, with the creation and the subsequent demolition of the terraced rows in the town centre, to the creation of the '**council**' estates and the more recent development of '**private**' estates.

Other housing developments have popped up in the area too, both council and private, including the current development of council bungalows off Portland Road.

If you're like me, we all like to reminisce about the good old days and what Shirebrook used to look like and how 'it was', and we all like to see the old photos !! So I thought I'd share these two old shots of Shirebrook and Langwith Junction showing how two local areas once where !!

The first, a shot of the old **'Army Stores'**, which occupied one of the corners of Market Place, is from around 1961 and shows Market Street before it was dissected by Portland Road.

As our more senior residents will know, King Edward Street finished at the junction of Victoria Street and there was no through road to Portland Road.

Buses of the day had to make a sharp turn at 'Ward's' corner to enter the tight confines of the market square, a little scary for some in those days !!



The second, shows a shot of Burlington Avenue from around eighty years ago.

At first, there seems to be very little difference after this length of time. On the right hand side, from the shop upwards, the terraced houses seemingly remain the same, apart from perhaps new windows and satellite dishes that have been erected over the years.

Look on the left hand side of the photo, there's no



The long shot shows terraces from the market through to Sookholme Road and just off camera are another row of terraces on the opposite side.

As we have reported before, the centre of Shirebrook was made up of street upon street of terraced rows which housed the vast majority of Shirebrook residents of the day

Next door to the Army Stores was Jacksons the butcher, one of around thirteen butchers in the town's heyday.

For our younger readers, the Army Stores was a variation of the Army and Navy Stores that were used to dispose of the surplus stores following the demobilisation of the conscripted forces after WWII.



houses !! The Blackwell Rural District Council built semi's, didn't start to appear until around the 1930's.

Take a closer look at the photo and the horizon is different too. The far distance shows a lack of properties on Recreation Road, which, just prior to that was the main road from Langwith Bassett to Shirebrook, which terminated at the recreation ground, on the boundary between Shirebrook and Langwith.



Also the housing on the right seems to stop at the junction of Station Road. The properties on The Crescent & Chatsworth Avenue were built at the same time as the properties on Burlington Avenue.

Behind these terraced houses once stood the Langwith Junction Train Station (Shirebrook North).

The Langwith Junction Station was built in 1897 by the Lancashire, Derbyshire & East Coast Railway, as part of the line than ran from Nottingham to Chesterfield.

The L.D.E.C. was later taken over by the Great Central Railway and the line eventually closed in 1964.

And as many will remember, you couldn't get into Shirebrook without crossing over or going under a bridge !!

and 12.00noon, and provides assistance, support and advice to people with debt problems and those claiming benefits. All who come along are made to feel very welcome and offered refreshments and support.

£800 to **Shirebrook Neighbourly Allotment Group** (SNAG), which is supported and run by Marcin Proc and colleagues at Derbyshire Unemployed Workers Centre.

The funding was used to purchase a new polytunnel cover, garden tools and equipment and seeds to grow produce. The group support people's mental health and wellbeing through gardening and growing vegetables and flowers, bringing people together where they can to make new friendships and prevent social isolation.

They meet on Saturdays at the allotment off Park Avenue, Shirebrook and will make you very welcome if you want to join them.

£800 to **Café 101.** They too support people's mental health and wellbeing and prevent social isolation and open weekly on Thursday mornings between 10.00am and 12.00noon in Holy Trinity Church Hall off Church Drive.

They make especially nice cheese toasties and snacks at very reasonable prices. They also offer craft work, trips, training for volunteers and signpost to mental health services for those needing greater support. **£500** to **Model Village Residents Association Shirebrook** to contribute to King Charles Coronation to provide every child at Model Village Primary School with a King Charles Coronation badge, a memento of the occasion.

£2,000 to the Community Hub at New Houghton to support various groups at the hub. They've started a monthly Craft Club on Saturdays for adults, a Mother and Toddler group weekly on Tuesday mornings, and Luncheon Clubs and Warm Spaces are run on Wednesdays, Fridays and alternate Sundays.

£1,000 donation to **BLAST** towards six summer trips, four for the children's youth club in the summer holidays, a trip for the adult craft club which meets on Wednesdays mornings at Hole in the Wall, Shirebrook and a trip for the Art Group which meets at Upper Langwith Village Hall on Friday afternoons.

Highway Matters - The Highways Authority are reducing the speed limit in Upper Langwith Village, which will make it safer for the residents, cyclists, walkers, and in particular children who cross the road by The Devonshire pub walking to and from Shirebrook Academy on Common Lane.

Under the new Traffic Order, the speed is limited to 30mph the entire length of Rectory Road, from its junction with the A632 through the extent of Upper Langwith Village, and up to the junctions with Station Road at Langwith Bassett.

Currently Rectory Road is a two way carriageway with a speed limit of 60mph, reducing to 40mph through the extents of Upper Langwith Village. This is considered by the highways authority no longer a safe speed limit.

Adult Care at the County Council are holding a consultation with Carers, Users of Home Care and the Public into reviewing charges for elderly and disabled people who receive home care. This consultation will commence at the beginning of July until September and the public can contribute to this consultation online.

Whatever the outcome of the consultation, charges will increase and will affect the elderly and disabled on low incomes, one of the most vulnerable groups in society.

County receive an income of £8 million pounds a year from the service users in charges, and want to increase their income, by adding between £7million to £11million on to the existing £8million they already receive in payment from the users. They are increasing their income and make savings at the same time.

The current regime has in the past six years removed many frontline services; the closure of seven residential homes, the handy man service for the elderly, closure of libraries which are on going, closure of all youth services and clubs, and removing early help social workers, who specialised in supporting struggling parents to prevent children having to go into care.

This hasn't been without cost to the taxpayer, in particular the enormous increase in numbers of children taken into care. It has been very expensive and increased our council tax, so this particular project was a failed **'money saving'** exercise, which severely affected the lives of vulnerable children and their families. However this is now being addressed as County are now re-employing early help social workers to support vulnerable families.

The thing I can't get my head around is where is the common sense in all the savings on frontline services when they are going to spend more money on creating a fourth layer of government by creating a new Combined Authority with an elected Mayor from next year !!

County have already spent half a million from reserve funds recently on the setting up of this new Combined authority.

Well just a thought it seems unacceptable in a 'cost of living' crisis, to expect us to have to pay more in council taxes when our frontline services are being continually eroded away. *Cheerio for now !!*

for Shirebrook Town. A new chairman and vice chairman have been appointed with seven time British truck racing champion Ryan Smith taking on the role of Chairman, and Martyn Snell taking the role of vice chairman.

Upon their appointment vice chairman Martyn Snell said: "We are both delighted to have been made so welcome by everyone at the club. Shirebrook is a thriving community with great honest hardworking people and the football club is at the very heart of it.

VALUE FOR MONEY ? NOT !! Last time we briefly mentioned the continued problems of pot-holes and what would be the best and most cost-effective ways of repair.

In particular we mentioned the junction of Recreation Road and Albine Road with the top of Burlington Avenue, a stretch of road that has continued to be problematic over recent years.

In late-February, man and plant where on site, scratching out damaged areas and re-patching the offending areas. Work went into a third day and caused inconvenience to local residents and traffic alike with traffic lights in operation.

If anything, following these '**repairs**' the stretch of road was in a worse state than when repairs commenced. Complaints were made, and guess what, man and plant where back on site less than two weeks later !!

Surely this is not the best way of repairing our roads and definitely not the most cost effective way of repair !!

According to a recent study it would cost more than $\pounds 12$ billion to fix all potholes in England and Wales, an increase of more than $\pounds 2.4$ billion in twelve months, and despite increased budgets, local authority highway teams only received around two thirds of the funding they needed to prevent further deterioration of local roads.


The report also states that the present rate of local



road **'resurfacing'** is so slow that if it were to continue, local roads would only be resurfaced every 116 years on average. *With regards to potholes, they say that one is filled every 22 seconds !!*

In the most recent '**Budget**' we saw a further £200million for highways maintenance for this financial year, this was in addition to the existing highways maintenance funding settlement announced in the October 2021, which committed over £2.7billion of local highways maintenance funding between tax years 2022 and 2025.

There must be better ways of repairing our roads and there surely must be a more cost effective way of repairing and maintaining the said roads !! What do you think ??

DID YOU KNOW ?

Now a Grade II listed building, construction of the first church in Shirebrook started in 1843, and was designed by William Patterson and Thomas Chambers Hine of Nottingham, and cost £1,000.

The 'building' was consecrated by the Bishop of Lichfield, the Rt. Revd. John Lonsdale on the 9th of October 1844.

The Church was later extended with the construction of a nave to the designs of architect Hedley John Price. Subsequently, the 'old' church building became the 'south aisle", and increased the capacity from 200 to 800 persons.

The 'nave' was dedicated by the Bishop of Southwell, the Rt. Revd. George Ridding on the 30th of April 1904.

The **'brass eagled'** lectern was donated in 1904 by a Mrs Harker, and was a replica of the one given by Queen Victoria to Sandringham Church. The people of Shirebrook donated to a **'shilling fund'** which paid for the panelling of the high altar.

Prior to the construction of Holy Trinity, Shirebrook was part of Pleasley Parish, with no church of its own. Instead the village had a 'chapel of ease', a consecrated church that was not a parish church but fell within a parish that does have a parish church.

Former Vicars included Arnold Herbert Hurt, who was the father of the late star of the silver screen and television, John Hurt.

HOW DO I?

Book a christening or a wedding in church ? To book a christening, also known as a baptism, or a wedding, come along to Holy Trinity Church on the first Monday of each month between 7pm and 8pm – we will be happy to help you book and make the arrangements for your special event.

There is no charge for christenings in church. If you are booking a christening for your child, it doesn't matter if you aren't married or if you haven't been christened yourself.

Hear my banns read ?

Banns are read for three weeks before weddings in church at our usual church service at 11am on Sunday mornings.

When you book your wedding, you will be told on which Sundays the banns will be read. It's a special time and one that you can share with the church community.

Arrange a funeral in church ?

To arrange a funeral, please speak to your funeral director. They will make the arrangements for the time in church and for an officiant to lead the service. They will explain the costs involved and help you choose things like hymns for the service.

Attend a church service ?

Services at Holy Trinity are held each Sunday at 11am. Everyone is welcome to attend – please feel free to come along. There is no dress code to attend church but please remember it is a large, stone building and can get cold.

PALS will bring together different agencies and services to support individuals and families in their households and within their lives.

It helps to assess their needs, unpick situations, and provide consistent support in an effort to improves their lifestyle and become more physically active. The **PALS** approach recognises that there are three key elements when attempting to create behaviour change:

- Capability to change
- Motivation to change
- Opportunity to change

Alongside these, there are also five key factors that have an impact on the above: Age, Gender, Socio-economic, Ethnicity and Disability / Condition.

A **PALS** co-ordinators role is to help join the dots as there are many agencies and organisations working hard to provide services to the people within their community, all with the aim of improving overall community health and wellbeing.

They will create a package / personal plan to enable a path to a more active and healthier lifestyle working with other agencies to navigate through what is available for the individual or family.

Self referral forms are available from Council offices and locally from Shirebrook Leisure Centre.
